HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Here's the garden in all its glory: corn on the cob, glossy eggplant, and all the delicious things that make a good tossed salad. They look pretty in the garden, and even more handsome on the platter.

Eggplant Stuffed.

- 2 small or 1 large eggplant
- 2 onions, chopped fine
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
- 1 pound ground beef
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/2 cup grated cheese
- 2 tablespoons milk

Cut eggplant lengthwise, and scoop out pulp from the center. Saute the onions in butter, add the pulp of the eggplant, parsley, and then the meat. Season with salt and pepper and mix well. Simmer about 10 minutes. Stuff the eggplant shells with the mixture, cover and bake in a moderate oven (350°) for 30-35 minutes. Mix egg, cheese and milk, and season with a dash of salt and pepper. When eggplant is cooked, remove from the oven, and cover each one with the cheese mixture. Place under the broiler and brown. Serves six.

Tossed Salad and Tomato Soup Dressing.

Break a head of lettuce in pieces and slice a Chinese Cabbage. Quarter an unpeeled cu-

cumber and cut in thin slices. Cut tomatoes in wedges, slice radishes and break row cauliflower into flowerets. Cut celery into pieces and add watercress. Place above ingredients in salad bowl which has been rubbed with clove of garlic. Vegetables should not be cut too fine. Serves 6 to 8 people.

Icebox Dessert.

Cut 1/2 lb. marshmallows in pieces. Pour over them 1 1/4 cups hot milk and stir well; then add 1/2 cup dates cut and 1/4 cup chopped nuts. Then add 2 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs. Mix thoroughly. Place in loaf pan. Let stand 12 hours in ice box. Slice and serve with whipped cream.
