### Sunday School Lesson

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 18, 1949 THEME-Psalms for Daily Living (Temperance). Psalms 15; 24:1-16;

The King of Glory Entering Zion, Psalm 24. Dr. F. B. Meyer thinks the psalm was composed for a choir, that the two first verses might have been sung by a festal crowd, the third by a single voice, the fourth and fifth by the choir, and the sixth by the entire congregation.

The fulness thereof, verse 1. All that is in it. Moffatt's translation is, All that earth holds. The world, and they that dwell therein. "It is remarkable that this Bebrew bard leaped beyond the limitations of his race and realized that the wide earth and the fulness was not less God's care than the favored shrine where he recorded his name. Surely Handel made befitting use of these words as fulfilled in the return of the ascending Lord to his home" (F. B. Meyer).

Hath founded it upon the seas and established it upon the floods, verse 2. The ancient idea was that under the earth was water. Recall the commandment that no likeness shall be made of anything that is in the water under the earth. Ex. 20:4.

Who shall stand in his holy place? verse 3. Who shall stand within his sacred shrine? Moffatt's translation reads:

He only who has clean hands and a heart unafraid,

Who never sets his mind on what is false.

Who never breaks his word. "Hands are the symbols of activity, of work, of doing things; and the heart, of course, means the source of our being, our inner life."

Righteousness from the God of his salvation. "Righteousness is a gift of God and a part of the salvation he bestows" (Dummelow).
