'Recipe Of Week' Is

CANDIED SWEET POTATOES

Six medium-sized sweet potatoes, ¼ cup butter or margarine, ½ cup brown sugar, ¼ cup water. Boil potatoes, pare, and cut in halves lengthwise. Heat butter or margarine and brown sugar in heavy frying pan. Add potatoes, turn until brown on both sides. Add water, cover closely, reduce heat, and cook until tender and delicately brown. Potatoes may be cooked in slow oven. Serve 6.

CHERRY CREAM PIE

(Serves 6-8)

- 1 nine-inch pie shell, unbaked
- 2 cups cherries, pitted, drained
- ¾ cup sugar
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 2 egg yolks
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice or water
- ¼ teaspoon salt

- 1 tablespoon melted butter
- 1. Grease bottom of unbaked pie crust with melted butter.
- 2. Place fruit in the pie shell.
- 3. Combine the remaining ingredients in a bowl and beat.
- 4. Spread over the fruit.
- 5. Bake in a preheated gas oven at 400 degrees F. for 20 minutes.
- 6. Reduce the heat and bake in a moderate gas oven 350 degrees F., for 20 minutes.
