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It's New at N.U.

This is the first of a series in this column which will feature alumni of the University of Ne- THEME-The Church Empowbraska. The outstanding personality this week is Arthur C. Schropshire, who is now writing his doctor's dissertation in School Administration at the university.

Mr. Schropshire attended elementary school in Paris, Mo., and high school at Douglas school in Hannibal, Mo. He graduated from Lincoln university in Jefferson City, Mo., where he obtained a

bachelor of science degree with a major in biology and a minor in chemistry. Later he received a Master of Science degree in School Administration at the University of Nebraska.

He has served as principal of the Langston school in De Soto, Mo., where he established the high school department.

Mr. Schropshire organized the Festaus Cooperative high school which served Negroes in seven counties where Negroes had previously been denied the opportuniey of attending high school.

Now he is principal of the Bartlett high school and supervisor of Negro education in St. Joseph. Mo. Under his leadership Bartlett school was admitted to the North Central association. Recently Mr Schropshire was selected to serve on the Missouri Admissory committee of the North Central asso-

The East Central Teachers association of Missouri was organized under his direction. He served in the capacity of president of the association for two years and as vice president for two years. Durization successfully waged a fight for uniform salaries to teachers with equal qualification.

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Sunday School Lesson

ered. Acts 2:1-41.

The Church is Born. Pentecost -the fiftieth day after the first day of the passover-was a time of solemn thanksgiving, when the first fruits of the completed harvest were offered to God. The disciples' long-continued season of prayer was now about to bear fruit. The Spirit could not be given until the group was completely unified, until all evil had been purged from every heart and until every soul was yielded. When the group was ready to receive, God was ready to give.

We need to reflect this as a pattern to which the modern church must conform for regeneration and growth in spiritual

Wind and flame are two basic and powerful natural forces. Jesus, in describing the life of the Spirit, had likened it to wind which "bloweth where it will, and thou hearest the voice thereof, but knowest not whence it cometh, and whither it goeth; so is every one that is born of the Spirit' (John 3:8). Wind and spirit were in the Greek language designated zy the same ward, penuma. So the rushing wind represented both the Spirit and the action of the Spirit. The flame represented the purging power of the Spirit on sinfu' human hearts, his capacity to produce warmth and zeal. Flame was also a symbol of life and enlightenment.

The believers began to speak with tongues. This strange phenomenon was very necessary in the beginning; it has probably disappeared because it is no longer necessary. We shall probably never know exactly what this speaking with tongues meant, but it appears to have been an ecstatic utterance of praise. thanksgiving and adoration.

The amazing thing was on this occasion, many of these disciples pourned forth their adoration in languages with which they were entirely unfamiliar. This, of course, was in every sense mi-
