Dear Readers:

It's all over, even the shouting. Maybe you are one who would like to live the whole holiday season over again but I doubt it. Like most of us you're probably ready for some long quiet evenings at home with meals that can be labeled "just for the family."

There are a lot of good cooks among our readers and I wonder if you wouldn't share some of your special recipes that your family is especially fond of? We, The Voice, would be happy to have them. Call me at 2-4051 or Mrs. Shakespeare at 5-6491 and we will be happy to put them in our column. Here is a good one for a starter.

Ham-and-Egg Pie.

(New fashion for an old favorite)
6 tablespoons chopped celery
6 tablespoons chopped onion
4 tablespoons butter or margarine
1/2 cup flour
3 cups milk
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
3 hard-cooked eggs
3 cups cubed, cooked ham
Tomato biscuit dough

Brown celery and onion in butter. Blend in flour. Add milk gradually and stir until thick. Add salt. Add eggs, cut in quarters, and ham. Place in a greased 1 1/2-quart baking dish and cover with lattice biscuit made as follows:

Make regular biscuit dough, substituting tomato juice for the liquid in the recipe. Roll dough out to 1/4-inch thickness and cut in strips. Place in lattice fashion over top of pie. Bake in a hot oven (400°F.) 30 minutes, or until crust is well browned. Serves six.
