SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON
Amos the Prophet and His Program
Scripture—Amos 7:7-15; 8:1-3.

Memory Selection—Seek the Lord and ye shall live. Amos 5:6.

Our ministers today, the modern "Prophets," have definite programs outlined for them if their work is to succeed. They must plan the activities of their churches, work out sermons related to the special observances of our church year—such as Palm Sunday, Easter, etc. They must plan their church school work, institutes for their workers, a routine of pastoral visitation, must carry communion to the sick. They must visit and comfort the dying, and bury the dead. They must plan means of raising finances—to administer to the needy, to care for themselves and for the maintenance of their institution, and for the denominational work—its overhead and its benevolences. Amos had none of these things to do. His program seemed to be principally to deliver God's messages when and where he was prompted to do so. Our ministers are not excused from doing this same thing—they are to deliver God's messages, not to be so concerned about their programs that they do not have time to hear what God would have them say to His people. The plumbline test is needed today—and in the "mist of the House of Israel"—in our churches as well as elsewhere. Can we stand the test? God will not always spare us or forgive us.
