Household Hints

Scalloped Liver and Potatoes

- 6 potatoes
- 1 lb. liver
- 1 onion, minced
- 1 green pepper
- 1 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 cups milk

Boil the potatoes in their jackets; when done, peel and cut in slices. Drop the liver in boiling salted water and cook from 5 to 10 minutes. Cut into small pieces. Grease a baking dish. Cover the bottom with a layer of potatoes, add a layer of liver, and sprinkle with onions, green peppers, and seasoning. Repeat until the ingredients are used. Add milk and bake for 30 minutes in a moderate oven (350° F.).

Seven-Minute Frosting

- 2 egg whites
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 5 tablespoons cold water
- 1 1/2 teaspoons light corn sirup
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Put the egg whites (unbeaten), sugar, water, and corn sirup in the upper part of the double boiler. Place it over rapidly boiling water, beat constantly with a rotary egg beater, and cook 7 minutes or until the frosting will stand in peaks. Remove from the fire, add vanilla, and beat until thick enough to spread.

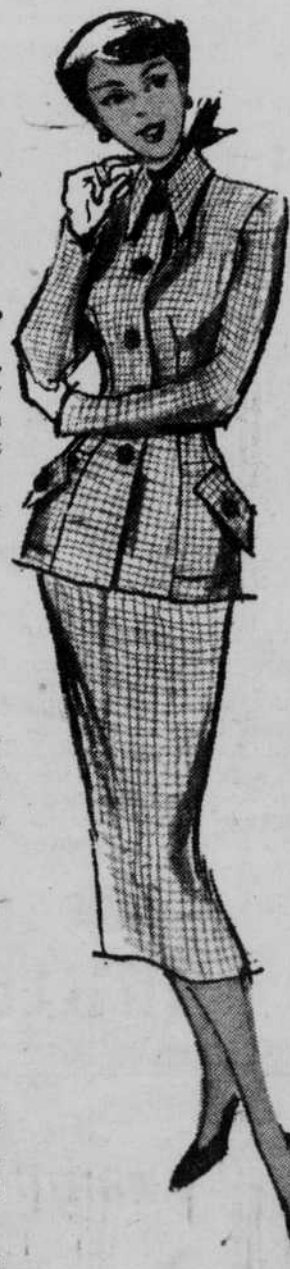
