Walnut Marble Spice Cake.

3 cups sifted cake flour

1/2 teaspoon salt % cup butter or other shortening

134 cups sugar

3 eggs

11/2 teaspoons cinnamon

teaspoon nutmeg

3 teablespoons molasses cup finely chopped walnuts

once, measure baking powder, salt: sift together 3 shortening and until

sugar light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, beat

well. Add flour Bettie Huston alternately with milk at little at a time, beating till smooth each

time. Divide batter into two parts, to part 1 add spices, molasses and walnuts. Put batter by tablespoonfuls into 9" tube pan alternating light and dark mixtures. Bake in 350° for one hour. Frost with favorite frosting, decorate with walnuts.

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
