HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Even though the first of June has arrived, we are still having rainy and dreary weather. Those are the days you like to have a cheery menu, like the one I have planned for this week.

- Wilted Lettuce
- Chicken Pie
- Harvard Beets
- Butter
- Bread
- Jelly
- Old-Fashion Rice Pudding
- Chicken Pie
- 5 tablespoon chicken fat or butter
- 1/2 cup sliced onion
- 4 tablespoons flour
- 2 cups chicken stock
- Salt and pepper
- 2 to 3 cups cooked chicken, cut in pieces
- 1 cup canned peas
- 1 cup diced cooked carrots

Heat fat; add onion and cook over low heat about 10 minutes or until soft and lightly browned. Add flour and stir until blended; slowly add stock and stir over low heat until thick and smooth; season to taste. Add a little celery salt and onion salt if desired. Arrange chicken meat and vegetables in layers in a large casserole. Cover with sauce. Top with rich biscuit topping. Bake in (425°F) about 20 minutes. Makes about six servings.

- Wilted Lettuce
- 4 to 6 cups shredded lettuce
- 2 strips bacon diced
- 1 tablespoon brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Few grains pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika
- 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
- 3 tablespoon vinegar
- 1 tablespoon water

Wash lettuce thoroughly. Cook

bacon until crisp. Combine dry ingredients and add to bacon. Add vinegar and water; heat to boiling point. Heat the lettuce in the hot sauce just enough to wilt it. Allow two medium-sized heads of lettuce for six to eight servings.

- Harvard Beets
- 2 1/2 cups diced beets
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons cornstarch
- 1/2 cup vinegar
- 1/2 cup beet liquid or water
- 1 tablespoons butter

Drain beets, reserving liquid. Combine; sugar and cornstarch stir in vinegar and beet liquid or water; stir over low heat until thickened. Add beets and butter; heat. Makes about five servings.

- Old-Fashioned Rice Pudding
- 1/2 cup rice
- 4 cups milk
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- Grated rind 1/2 lemon

Wash rice, mix with other ingredients and pour into a buttered pudding dish. Bake three hours in a very slow oven (250°F.) stirring three times during the first hour of baking to prevent the rice from settling.
