**Chocolate Icebox Delight**

- 4 squares unsweetened chocolate
- 1/2 cup sugar
- Dash of salt
- 1/4 cup hot water
- 4 egg yolks
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 4 egg whites, stiffly beaten
- 1 cup cream, whipped

1/2 cup finely chopped walnut meats, if desired  
1 1/2 dozen (36 split) lady fingers  
Melt chocolate in top of double boiler. Add sugar, salt and water, stirring until sugar is dissolved and mixture blended. Remove from boiling water; add egg yolks, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each. Place over boiling water and cook 2 minutes, or until thickened, stirring constantly. Add vanilla and fold into egg whites. Chill. Fold in whipped cream and nuts.

Arrange lady fingers on bottom and sides of dish. Turn chocolate mixture into dish and place remaining lady fingers on top. Chill 12 to 24 hours in refrigerator. Makes eight servings. A.N.P.
