MEMPHIS. (ANP)—About 100 representatives of 20 local civic clubs met last week in the Lauderdale branch of the YMCA to form a council of civic clubs. Main goal of the newly-formed organization is to get 75 per cent of the Negro population of the city and county registered to vote.

The officers elected are:

NASHVILLE—(ANP)—Charles H. Bynum, director of Interracial activities for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, last week presented a check for \$48,800 to Dr. Michael J. Bent, dean of Meharry Medical college. This is the fifth annual educational grant made to the college.

These funds now total \$341,650 and were made possible by the March of Dimes. They help to provide instruction in pediatrics, orthopedic surgery, and a physical therapy program.

The awarding of the grant was announced jointly by Basil O'Connor, president of the Infantile Paralysis Foundation, and Dr. Robert A. Lambert, chairman of the Interim Committee at Meharry.

Jellied Salmon Mold

1 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture.
1 cup boiling water
¼ cup vinegar
2 tablespoons sugar
½ cup salad dressing
¼ teaspoon salt
1 cup cooked salmon
½ cup chopped celery
¼ cup chopped sweet pickles
Pour water over gelatin mixture and stir until dissolved. Add vinegar and sugar. Allow to thicken a little and add rest of ingredients. Pour into mold (heart shape if desired) and chill in refrigerator. Carefully unmold, garnish with lettuce and top with more salad dressing. This is an effective salad to serve for buffet supper. The top can be garnished with strips of pickles and halves of hard cooked eggs.

Dutch Apple Pie

6 or 8 apples
1 cup sour cream
1 cup granulated sugar
½ cup granulated cinnamon
2 tablespoons flour
1 tablespoon cooking tapioca
Wash, pare and quarter the apples. Combine the flour and tapioca and pat into the bottom and sides of an unbaked pie shell. Combine cream, sugars and cinnamon. Dip each apple section in this cream mixture, then place in unbaked pastry shell. After pie shell is filled, pour the remaining cream mixture over the ap-

ple sections and place in a hot oven. After 15 minutes reduce the temperature and continue baking for one hour, or until the apples are tender.

Cocoanut Drop Cake

¾ cup butter
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
2-3 cup milk
½ teaspoon lemon extract
1 teaspoon vanilla
¼ teaspoon salt
2 cups pastry flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
¼ cup cocoanut
Cream butter and sugar. Add rest of ingredients except cocoanut. Beat 2 minutes. Half fill paper cups, sprinkle tops with cocoanut. Bake 15 minutes in moderate oven.

Chocolate Bars

One cup sugar, one egg (unbeaten) one-fourth cup melted butter, one-half teaspoon vanilla, two squares unsweetened chocolate, melted; one-half cup flour, one-half cup chopped nuts. Line pan with waxed paper, bake 20 minutes in moderate oven.
