**HOUSEHOLD HINTS**

**Sweet Sandwiches:** If a dessert such as tapioca pudding, cake or pie, are carried, a sandwich with a sweet filling may be omitted. But if the dessert is fresh fruit, banana, apple, orange or pear, for instance, one sandwich may be meat, eggs or cheese and the other may be sweet, such as chopped raisins and nuts or peanut butter and jelly, jams, marmalade or preserves. Children like prunes and dates stuffed with soft cheese or nuts. They may be eaten as is or use to make a sweet sandwich.

**Desserts packed in small jar:** Custards, ice pudding, tapioca pudding with chocolate or fruit sauce, baked apple tapioca, baked apple, apple sauce, stewed prunes, apricots or peaches and drained fruits with custard sauce. Pack cold desserts after they have been well chilled.

Here's a good dessert for the lunch box:

**Fluffy Tapioca Cream with Chocolate Sauce**  
1 egg white  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1 egg yolk  
cups milk  
2 or 3 tablespoons sugar  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Beat egg white until foamy throughout; add 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, and continue beating with rotary egg

beater until mixture will stand in soft peaks. Set aside.

Mix egg yolk with about 1/4 cup of the milk in saucepan. Add 2 or 3 tablespoons sugar, salt, tapioca and remaining milk. Place over medium heat. Cook until mixture comes to a boil, stirring constantly—this takes 5 to 8 minutes.

Pour small amount of hot tapioca mixture gradually on beaten egg-white, blending well. Then quickly add remaining mixture, stirring constantly. (The hotter the tapioca and the faster it is blended in, the thicker and fluffier the pudding will be). Add vanilla. Cool, stirring once after 15 to 20 minutes. Chill. Serve with chocolate sauce. Make 4 or 5 servings.

**READ THE LABEL ON FOODS, DRUGS, DEVICES, COSMETICS**
