HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Apple Pudding Delight

2 cups sliced apples 1/4 teaspoon lemon extract
1 cup water 1/4 teaspoon almond extract
1/2 cup sugar 1/4 cup jam
1/4 teaspoon salt 2 egg whites, beaten
1/2 cup tapioca 1/4 cup confectioner's sugar
2 cups milk
2 egg yolks
1 teaspoon vanilla

Boil apples and water 5 minutes. Add sugar and boil 10 minutes. Cook in double boiler 15 minutes, the salt, tapioca and milk, add apple mixture and yolks. Cook 5 minutes. Add extracts and pour into shallow buttered baking dish. Spread with jam and cover with egg whites to which confectioner's sugar has been added. Bake 20 minutes in slow oven. Serve warm or cold, plain or with cream.

Hot Milk Sponge Cake

3 eggs
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon lemon extract
1/2 vanilla
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup pastry flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup hot milk

Beat eggs three minutes, add

rest of ingredients, mixing lightly. Pour into ungreased pan and bake 40 minutes in moderately slow oven. Invert pan until cake has cooled; it can then be loosened and will easily slip out. Sift flour and sugar separately three times before measuring.

Lemon Taffy

1 1/2 cups brown sugar
1/2 cup water
4 tablespoons butter
2 teaspoons lemon juice

Mix all ingredients and boil to a soft ball (240 degrees Fahrenheit). Pour on buttered dish and when cool enough to handle pull until it becomes a golden color. Cut into squares with scissors.
