# How To Organize A Local League

Taken from Constitution and By-Laws of The Connectional Lay Organization

LOCAL LAY ORGANIZATIONS:

The procedure to be followed in organizing Lay Groups in the local churches will depend to a large extent upon existing local conditions. Those who seek to organize, and who may not be familiar with the procedure, should consult the President of the Conference lay organization (if the conference has been organized), if not, advice may be obtained directly from the President of the Connectional Lay Organizations. It is highly adivsable to obtain the full cooperation, good will and support of the minister.

The 1948 Edition of the A.M.E. Discipline outlines a procedure on page 342, paragraph 353B, which should prove helpful and beneficial in organizing local lay groups:


