**Roast Turkey**

In buying, choose a hen if you need a 5 to 15 pound bird and a ton if you need anything larger. A 15 pounder will serve 12 generously. Before stuffing, remove pin feathers with tweezers, and if feathery, singe over flame. Wash inside and out under cold running water. Drain thoroughly and dry well. Allow about one cup of stuffing to one pound of bird. Stuff lightly so there will be room for swelling. Stuff neck cavity, then secure by folding skin under and attach it to the back with a skewer. Secure the large opening by sewing up with a soft thread or sticking toothpicks across opening and lacing with a soft twine. Tie legs together firmly and fasten to tail.

Place turkey breast side up in a shallow roasting pan. Brush the whole bird with butter or margarine. Then soak three pieces of cheese cloth — (enough to wrap both legs and cover breast)—in more melted fat. Place in pre-heated oven (325 F). Baste right through the cheese cloth at least a half dozen times during roasting. Cooking time—15 minutes per lb. or 4½ to 5 hours. Roast uncovered.

**Stuffing**

Bread stuffing—4 cups dry bread cubes  
2 tablespoons chopped onion — 1 teaspoon salt  
¼ teaspoon pepper—¼ teaspoon poultry seasoning.  
½ cup melted butter, hot water or stock to moisten  
Sage to taste.—Combine bread,

onion, and seasonings. Add butter and liquid to moisten. Toss gently to mix.—Or try—Oyster stuffing as follows—

½ cup chopepd celery—½ cup chopped onion—¼ cup butter  
6 cups dry bread crumbs — 1 tablespoon chopped parsley—  
3 cups chopped oysters — 1 bay leaf—salt and pepper—  
1 teaspoon poultry seasoning—2 beaten eggs—  
1¾ cups milk and oyster liquor—

Cook celery and onion in butter until soft, but not brown. Add crumbs and parsley, milk thoroughly. Add oysters, bay leaf, seasonings, and eggs. Add enough liquid to moisten.

If you can't afford a turkey, serve—

**Mince-meat Pie**

1 pound can mince-meat—2 cups thinly sliced apples.  
½ teaspoon grated lemon peel—  
2 tablespoons lemon juice.

Combine mince-meat, apples lemon peel, and juice, heat thoroughly. Pour into 9 inch pastry-lined pie pan, adjust top crust. If you wish a glazed top (which is really attractive) rub top crust with a tablespoon of heavy coffee cream, covering thoroughly.

If you wish to make your own mince-meat, here 'tis.—
