Scalloped Apples and Cabbage

- 4 cups sliced apples
- 4 cups shredded cabbage
- 3 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup buttered soft bread crumbs
- 4 slices bacon

Wash, core and slice tart apples without peeling. In a buttered baking dish, place half the apples and sprinkle with half the sugar. Add half the cabbage and salt, then continue with apples and cabbage. Top with buttered bread crumbs. Bake uncovered in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F, for about 35 minutes. After 15 minutes of baking, place slices of bacon over the top to cook until crisp.

A suggested menu for inclusion of this dish is: Roast pork,

browned potatoes, scalloped apples and cabbage, carrot and raisin salad, biscuits, butter and fruit cup with cookies.

Chocolate Mint Mallow Sauce

- 8 marshmallows (2 oz.) quartered
- 1/2 cup chocolate flavored syrup
- 1 tablespoon water
- 1/4 teaspoon peppermint extract

Put marshmallows in top of double boiler. Add water and cook over boiling water, stirring frequently until marshmallows are melted. Cool. Add chocolate syrup, stirring constantly. When well blended, add peppermint extract and mix well. Delicious served over ice cream. Makes about 3/4 cup.
