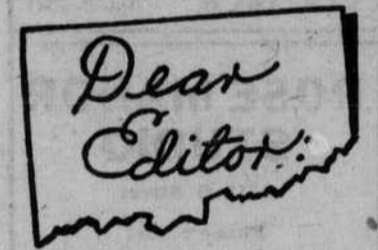

## UNCF Board Meeting Set for San Francisco January 10-12

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif. (ANP)—Presidents of the 31 colleges and universities affiliated with the United Negro College Fund will meet in the Fairmont hotel here for their semi-annual board meeting, Jan. 10-12. Business meetings, an alumni reception for the presidents and a convocation featuring several prominent speakers are on the agenda for the confab.

The Golden Gate city was selected as the site for the meeting because the college presidents will have attended the convention of the American Association of Colleges and Universities in that city the preceding week.

During their stay in San Francisco the college presidents will be featured speakers on Sunday, Jan. 11, in churches of various denominations throughout the city and the Bay Area as part of "United Negro College Fund Sunday." In the afternoon an alumni reception to honor the presidents will be held at the Residents Club.

On Monday, Jan. 12, a convocation will be held in the Gold Room of the Fairmont hotel and the program chairman for this affair will be Gene Walker, local public relations counsel. The featured speaker will be Dr. Lindsley F. Kimball, vice president of the Rockefeller Foundation. Other addresses will be delivered by:

Dr. Charles S. Johnson, president of Fisk university; Dr. F. D. Patterson, president of Tuskegee institute and also president of the UNCF, and W. J. Trent, Jr., executive director of the fund.  
Several prominent San Francisco residents have scheduled luncheon and teas to honor the presidents' three-day visit to the city.
