The banks uniting to form such association shall, by their president or vice presidents, acting under authority from the board of directors, make and file with the secretary of the treasury a certificate setting forth the names of the banks comwhich name shall be subject to the approval of the secretary of the treasury. Upon the filing of such certificate the banks therein named shall become a body corporate and may sue and be sued and exercise the powers of a body corporate.

Not more than one such national clearing-house association shall be formed in any city. The several members of the association shall be taken, as nearly as conveniently may

Any national bank having the qualifications prescribed for membership house association for its respective subject to all the liabilities of an original member. No bank can be a member of two national clearinghouse associations.
