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BURIED

Mr. Hughes has been unfortunate in his campaign tour. It started fairly auspiciously, and for a day or so he aroused some interest. But, after all, the people aren't intensely interested in administrative questions, and when the railroad strike, with its sinister possibilities, overshadowed all else, Mr. Hughes and his declarations for civil service, a budget and protection were forgotten.

The plain fact of the matter is that Mr. Hughes isn't meeting the big issues of the day. At another time the pork barrel and civil service would perhaps bulk large in public interest. But, with the overshadowing issues of the war, and of our

own domestic questions, these matters seem relatively of slight importance. And on these big issues, though Mr. Hughes has criticised the President, he has offered no solution of his own.

The Eagle was of the opinion that there was just one man the republicans could nominate who, by the force of his personality, might have been able to work, up an effective constructive opposition to President Wilson. The events of the past few weeks seem to be bearing out that opinion. Mr. Hughes for the past week has been buried from sight.—Wichita (Kans.) Eagle.
