A Washington dispatch, Dec. 26 says: Declaring that this is no time for pussyfoot utterances, Will am D. Upshaw, Democratic representative to congress from Georgia, in a speech made in the House a few days ago, poured a broadside into cabinet members, governors and other high-up federal and state officials who, though obstensibly observing the prohibition law, were actually contributing to the continuance of the bootlegger and his nefarlous business by their private booze drinking.

He called on the high officials of the federal and state governments to sacredly declare that they will not build up a bootlegger's barbarous business by drinking illicit liquors at the same time they are denying the privilege to the poor among the

He called on the governors who were in Washington attending a conference with , the president, and all members of the cabinet, led by president and vice-president of the United States, to walk out in the open and take a new oath of allegiance to the constitution, adding that the plain people are skeptical of many of these high officials who urge prohibition and laugh at their high-sounding pronunciamentos because they doubt sincerity.

Mr. Upshaw asserted that if the governors really wished to get anywhere with law enforcement and reform, they ought to begin on them-
