The question is often asked, and many times by those who are esteemed the wisest and best of farmers—"Is dle and Western States, connecting at St. Louis with grass seed and clover seed, which is July 26, 1856. vl-n8 General Superintendent. more than one, two, or three years old, just as good as seed only one year

By many it is believed that there is is one or four years old; and it would seem that when proper care is exercised in securing such seed, not suffering it to be injured by storms, nor to heat in the mow before it is cleaned from the chaff, it would be good seed, and vegetate well even when it is a few years old. We have always thought, until recently, that old seed was as good as new, and have many times sown clover and timothy seed which was more than a year old, but have noticed almost invariably, that such seed did not seem to "take" well; and, BROWNVILLE FERRY not thinking that the seed was not good we have attributed such failure to the unfavorable condition of the soil-that it was covered too deep, or not covered at all with earth. But I have always had good success in seeding land, in both fall and winter, when I have used fresh seed. I have observed many times that those farmers who contend that old seed is just as good as new, and who are in the habit of sowing old seed, frequently complain that their

bushels of it, and none of it grew .--The cause of failure was thought to be the universal dryness of the soil.
