An Ordinance. No. 4. Be it Ordained by the Council of the City of Brownville, That the owners of lots fronting on the levee between Main and Atlantic streets be allowed to grade the levee and fill up the same to a grade which may be established by the Council, and that they be allowed eighteen cents for every square yard of natural earth so removed and graded, and upon the completion of such work it shall be the duty of the Recorder to issue a warrant on the City Treasurer for said amount.

An Ordinance. No. 5. Be it Ordained by the Council of the City of Brownville, That I, T. W. White, be authorized to procure the services of an auctioneer to establish a grade on the levee, and to have a line of level laid out in the same, and to be bound to complete the same within the time specified in the ordinance, and that he be allowed eighteen cents for every square yard of natural earth so removed and graded, and upon the completion of such work it shall be the duty of the Recorder to issue a warrant on the City Treasurer for said amount.
