Laws of the United States,
The following are the titles of the laws passed by the 35th Congress, 1st and 2nd sessions, for the purpose of providing for the construction of the Kansas and Nebraska railroads.

Section 30.1. That the lands granted to the State of Kansas by the United States for the construction of the Kansas and Nebraska railroads, shall be held for the benefit of the State of Kansas, and shall not be alienated, except in accordance with the provisions of this act.

Section 30.2. That the lands granted to the State of Nebraska by the United States for the construction of the Kansas and Nebraska railroads, shall be held for the benefit of the State of Nebraska, and shall not be alienated, except in accordance with the provisions of this act.

Section 30.3. That the lands granted to the State of Kansas by the United States for the construction of the Kansas and Nebraska railroads, shall be held for the benefit of the State of Kansas, and shall not be alienated, except in accordance with the provisions of this act.

Section 30.4. That the lands granted to the State of Nebraska by the United States for the construction of the Kansas and Nebraska railroads, shall be held for the benefit of the State of Nebraska, and shall not be alienated, except in accordance with the provisions of this act.

Section 30.5. That the lands granted to the State of Kansas by the United States for the construction of the Kansas and Nebraska railroads, shall be held for the benefit of the State of Kansas, and shall not be alienated, except in accordance with the provisions of this act.

Section 30.6. That the lands granted to the State of Nebraska by the United States for the construction of the Kansas and Nebraska railroads, shall be held for the benefit of the State of Nebraska, and shall not be alienated, except in accordance with the provisions of this act.

Section 30.7. That the lands granted to the State of Kansas by the United States for the construction of the Kansas and Nebraska railroads, shall be held for the benefit of the State of Kansas, and shall not be alienated, except in accordance with the provisions of this act.
