Lecompton Constitution Defeated! We have the inexpressible pleasure of announcing to our readers that the Lecompton Constitution, which passed the Senate on the 23d ult., by a vote of 34 to 24, was defeated in the House on the 1st met., by a vote of 120 to 112. The particulars, yeas and nays, &c., on the action of the Bill in the House, will be found under the Washington head in another column. The Sanate immediately took up the Bill, for consideration of the House amendment, and refused to recede. It is therefore unlikely, that the two Houses will ever agree upon this question.

Although the evidence has been such as to compel us publicly heretofore to acknowledge the probable passage of this Bill, we have nourished the hope and belief that in the last trying moment, the People's Representatives in National Council assembled, could not disregard that principle which gave birth to American independence—that corner stone upon which has been erected; and we believe is destined to remain, this Heaven favored and world admired Republic of ours. Right will triumph! It may be slow sometimes in achieving its victory; but it must and will prevail in the end. "As regards "Kansas difficulties," wi

have always studiously avoided discussing them; believing they are local and belong exclusively within her own boundaries .-When matters reached Congress, however, and when national principles were involved, and we in Nebraska particularly interested in the establishment of a precedent by the first admission under the "Kansas-Nebraska Act," we acknowledge that we felt no ordinary degree of interest; and have endeavored plainly and calmly to advance our views. We have not however attacked, nor assumed an antagonistic position to the Administration, as some are prone to construe, by so doing. We have ever, and do yet entertain the most exalted opinions of the patriotism and statesmanship of Mr. Buchanan. We believe him to be desirous perhaps extremely so, for the welfare of the nation over which he presides .-We understand his policy-his object in recommending the adoption of the Lecompton Constitution, viz: not to force upon Kansas a Constitution, but to force the people of Kansas into a position where they must settle their own affairs, and close the subject of national agitation .-This policy is right in itself, and we endorse it fully, freely and cheerfully. But with many thousands of others contend that it could not be carried into effect without sacrificing fundamental principles.
