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The Future Population of the U. S., of Nebraska, and Brownville.

There are laws governing the actions of communities and nations, as immutable and unvarying as the laws to which physical phenomena are subject. Even the occurrences that seem to be left to the free will and passions of men are not exceptions.

Allowing the increase of population to be 2 1/2 per cent per annum, the increase of population in the United States in ten years will be over 7,000,000, of inhabitants, without counting any from Europe.

The great financial crisis which swept like a hurricane over the country 12 months ago, almost suspended emigration during the last year, and will perhaps slightly retard it, during the coming season.

Now, is the most favorable time for emigrants who have some capital to locate in Nebraska, that ever has been, or probably ever will be again.

The remarks are sometimes made that the Territories "will not be all settled for ages to come"; that "there is yet more wild land remaining than all that is settled on, and that it will take as long a period of time for all this to settle up as has been since the first settlement of the States—several hundred years."

Latest News From the East. HULLYER, Sept. 5.

The steamer Hannania arrived on the 27th, and the Persia, with the Empress's passengers, on the 28th.

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Nothing has yet been heard from Senator Benjamin relative to the mission to Spain; but it is now supposed by his most intimate friends, that he will decline it.

Orders have been issued selecting the Sixth Infantry, now in service in the Department of Utah, for service in Washington and Oregon Territories.

Gov. King has issued a proclamation declaring Richmond County in a state of insurrection, and ordered a sufficient military force to be stationed at Quarantine to protect the lives of the sick, and the property of the State.

The annual State election took place today. Returns from sixty-two towns show the election of 50 Republicans and 11 Democrats to the Legislature—a Republican loss of one.

Scranton towns return the following vote for Governor, viz: Hillard Hall (Rep.), 3,880; Henry Keys (Dem.), 2,118. This is a Republican gain of 220 votes.

The Congressional ticket runs about equal with the State ticket, all the Republican candidates being elected by large majorities.

The Salt Lake Mail reached this city yesterday, in charge of Mr. O. Chausse, having left the city 20 days since.

Mr. Chausse states that one company of troops had left Bridger for Oregon, and that others would move in that direction soon.

Mr. Chausse confirms the reports of the South Platte Gold mines. He says several traders and mountaineers who had been in the mines. They report that gold is found there, and had many specimens in their possession.

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A prospectus has been issued in England, and extensively circulated, proposing the establishment of telegraphic communications with China and Australia.

It was rumored that the French Government had demanded explanations from England relative to the bombardment of Djeddah.

A report was in circulation, but it was considered doubtful, that Naples had accepted the conditions of the Western Powers.

It was stated that by the treaty of peace with China a million of francs is the amount of the Chinese indemnity to England and France.

Washington, Sept. 7. Judge James B. Bowlin, of Missouri, has been tendered the mission to Paraguai, and it is confidently believed he will accept it.
