PARTICULARS FROM OUR FLEET.

SIGNAL VICTORY -BEAUFORT IN OUR POSSESSION-FIFTY FIVE CANNON, 500 MUSKETS AND IMMENSE STORES CAP. TURED-A DESCRIPTION OF FORT ROYAY AND BEAUFORT.

Quincy, Nov. 14.

Capt. Steadman arrived at Washington at noon, bringing dispatches of Naval expedition. He is bearer of two rebel flags-one Palmetto, and the American flag first hoistad in South Carolina over

Capt. Steadman reports that the captured forts are magnificent earth covered ways and bomb proof, and that all our troops had to do was to occupy them .-They can be held against any opposing

Among the most efficient vessels were found to be the new gun bonts, of which the Navy Department had 23 constructed expressly for such purposes; and their success, both in the gale and under the fire, was perfect.

Commander Dayton of the Pocahontas, is the brother of Gen. Dayton, who commanded the rebel force. Capt. Steadman who brings the dispatches, is the son of a former Mayor of Charleston.

Ou the reception of the official dispatches the following order was issued: To commemorate this signal victory, it is ordered that a National salute be fired from each Navy Yardy M. the day, after the reception of this order.

The official dispatches brought by Capt Steadman are in substance what has previously been sent by telegraph.

N. Y. dispatches say orders have been received from Washington, to ship large quantities of ordinance stores to Port Royal immediately.

The Tribune's Washington dispatches of 13th says, since Halleck and Buell left Washington for their commands this morning, both are fully possessed of the plans and policy of the Administration of the Commander-in-Chief hencforth. It is believed that their will be a thorough unity of action among the Generals commanding the several departments, and all their actions will be parts of one cam-

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13. The Associated Press' account of recent victory and movements of our fleet is substantially same as others, but gives a few more particulars. The steamer Winf. Scott reached the rendezvous on the evening of 3rd, with loss of master and bow stove in. She threw over her 3 rifled cannon, all her freight, the muskets and equipments of her 400 men, and everything but her rations to keep her the soldiers in bailing, her fires would The force of the enemy as ascertained by England to be utterly untrue. The Times loyal men are bound to respect. The have been put out, and nothing then could have saved her. The stramer Bienville went to her relief, when her chief engineer, his associate and 13 seamen jumped aboard the Bicuville, leaving the Scott to her fate. Their action nearly created a panic among the soldiers, who gave up all for lost. The Capt. of the Scott put the chief engineer in irons and brought him and the recreant seamen back, when

things went on better. Col. Clark of 5th Pa. Reg't, which were on board the Scott, describes the night as one of horror. The gale was terrible, and the Stott was taken in tow by the Vanderbilt, which had cut clear from the Great Republic.

In the gale the steamer Governor went down with 20 men-the Pemlina taking

off all who could escape. The Siminole had 5 shots in her hull. The Wabash had her machinery disabled Five of 20 guns of the fort of Hilton Head were dismounted. There were 1800 rebels on Hilton Head and 1500 on Royal Point. We have captured 55 cannon, 500 muskets and any quantity of Creek to a village about 25 miles in the
