Next Monday is the cay fixed by an act passed at the last Session of the Legislature for the citizens of each county to meet at their respective county seats and enroll their names and form themselves into companies.

The 12th Section of the act reads as follows:

Sec. 12. The provisions of this act shall not be so construed as to apply to any county or counties where company or pology for a lack of these things; and if regiment already organized, so as to remove any officer or officers from the offices he or they may hold.

The War Tax for Nebraska. We see by the Congressional Globe that an amendment to the Tax Bill has passed the House diverting the Legisla-

Mr. HOOPER. I move the following amendment, to come in as a proviso at the end of the section:

Provided, That the sum of \$19,312, direct tax, laid upon the Territory of Nebraska by said act shall be paid and satisfied by deducting said amount from the appropriation for legislative expenses of said Territory of Nebraska for the year ending 30th of June, 1863, and no further claim shall be made by said Territory for legislative expenses for said year.

After considerable debate between Messrs. Hooper, Mallory. Stevens, Daily, Bennett and Watts, the amendment was adopted by a very large vote. We feel quite sure this will meet the approbation of the people of Nebraska, and hope the Senate will agree to the amendment.

WINCHESTER, March 25. On Saturday at 2 P. M., the enemy showed themselves a mile and a half from Winchester. The enemy consisted of 500 of Ashby's cavalry and two guns. They drove in our pickets and then skirmished with the Michigan cavalry and a portion of the Maryland first.
