LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES.

PUBLISHED BY AUTHORITY. CHAP. CLXXXIV .- An Act to smend an Act enti

tled "An Act to further promote the efficiency of the Navy," approved December twenty-first, eighteen hundred and sixty-one. Be it enocied by the Senate and House of Representative of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That section eight of an act to further promote the efficiency of the navy approved December twenty-first, eighteen hundr d and sixtyone, be amended so as to read as follows: That the rules to be observed in consolidating the hours af labor and the rate of wages of the employeas in the navy yards shall conform, as nearly as is onsistent with the public interest, with those of dia evicinity of the respective yards, to be determined by the commandants of the navy yards, subject to the approval and revision of the Secretary

> APPROVED, July 16, 1862. CHAP, CLXXXV .- An Act transferring the Western

That every person who shall bornafter commit the crime of treason, against the United States, and shall be adjudged guilty thereof, shall suffer death, and all his slaves, if any, shall be declared and made free; or at the discretion of the court, he shall be imprisioned for not less than five years and fined not less than ton thousand dollars; and all his slaves, is any, shall be declared and made free; said fine shall be levied and collected on any or all of the property, real and personal, excluding slaves, of which the said person so convicted was the owner at the time of committing the said crims any sale or conveyance to the contrary notwith-
