At ten o'clock on Saturday, Feb. \5th Indians were seen coming with a yell upon the station at Mud Springs. They commenced firing and did not cease until dark. Their first attempt was to start the horses that were near, driving them to my herd at Pumkin creek. At dark they cut the telegraph wire

Lt Ellsworth, at Fort Mitchel, had already been notified, and was on his way with fifty men to reinforce us. timely arrival was all that saved the post, as the fight was renewed. The second day, at sunrise, he surprised the Indians and routed them,

holding the ground all day. Col Collins came in at daylight on the third day with 150 men, when the ART. 11 .- When it shall be known fight opened immediately, the Indians getting possession of all the ground except the buildings. There was not less than 1.000 Indians in sight; but getting worsted, they drew off about three o'clock, losing a number of their men,

On the fourth day they made their appearance at sunrise, but made no general attack, Col. Collins sent out scouts in all directions to find their trail. That night artillery came and Col. Collins they had just broke camp. He followed warriors, who came to us in two columns, one on each side.
