Williams has been moving about, remaining but a short time in one place, and was preparing to move the day following his arrest. The prisoners are both heavily ironed and in safe hands.

We thought we were "oldest inhabitant" until last Monday, when Richard Brown—the Founder of Brownville—made his appearance in our office. He looks hale and hearty, and is thinking seriously of returning to his "first love" in the Spring. He admits a pleasurable surprise at the progress of Brownville, and is looking up property to locate on. This is not the first instance where our citizens have been lured away by the siren song of the railroad whistle—in perspective—or the "gigs-ometers" which operate in towns above; but in almost every instance they have returned much better satisfied with Brownville as a sound base for future operations.
