PERU LOCAL, JULY 10th. Having traveled about in this portion of the county some I find the wheat crop good, the chintz bug having done little or no damage. Farmers have commenced harvesting their fall wheat, and will commence cutting spring wheat the last of this week. There has been more corn sown this year than any previous year to my recollection, and present prospects indicate an extra crop. Corn never looked better since this country was settled, the late heavy winds having done it but little damage. Farmers appear to be in the best of spirits.

Messrs. Green, Burdick and Prouty and others are doing quite a business in freighting west. There are thirty-eight teams now loading and will start tomorrow for Julesburg with Corn. There are now twelve teams due from the west but not yet arrived, which will make, in all, fifty teams on the road from this place, mostly ox teams carrying from 40 to 60 hundred.

Hotel business is quite brisk here.—Wright & Son, of the old Union House, are building a large addition to their house. John W. Swan, a former resident of Brownville, has opened a House for the accommodation of the traveling public; we can assure to all good accommodations at the Traveler's Rest. Wm. L. Swan still keeps the best accommodations at the Peru Hotel.

D. C. Cole, Esq., our enterprising Post-master, is making extensive improvements in his Store; and is putting in a large stock of Dry Goods and Groceries for the accommodation of the public.

The Peru Flouring Mills are running night and day, and are turning out an extra quality of Flour.

Messrs. Daily, Neal and Green are still drilling for Coal, they are now down about 70 feet, and are very confident of finding coal soon. Something they have already struck "it," as they have pumped out an oily substance of some kind, but the matter remains very uncertain as yet. The rainy weather has stopped operations for the present, as soon as they get to work again, I will inform you further in regard to the prospects.
