City Council Proceedings, September 20th, 1885. Present: C. G. Dorsey, Mayor. Councilmen: Morrison, Cogswell and Johnson.

The following proposal was received: To the Council of the City of Brownville, Nebraska: We propose and offer to put in and run the Ferry on the Missouri River, at

Brownville, on or before the 24 day of November, 1885, a good, new and staunch Steam Ferry Boat, capable of carrying five teams and wagons per load; and to run such Steam Ferry Boat, or one sufficiently large to accommodate the public, at all times, for the next ensuing eleven years, and to run the same under such rules and regulations as shall be from time to time prescribed by said City Council, and, also, to land at such point on the Levee as they shall prescribe; Provided, The said City Council will give us the free use of said Ferry for six years, and for the remainder of said term, we agree to pay to said City the sum of two hundred dollars per year.

Brownville, Neb., Sept. 16, '85 Pursuant to call the members of the Baptist Church met at 11 o'clock, and, after prayer by Bro. Zook, organized for business, under the title of the Nemaha County Baptist Home Mission Association, by electing Eld. A. M. T. Zook, Moderator, and B. F. Rice, Secretary.

Moved that a committee of three be appointed to draft a Constitution for the government of this Association.

Moved that the Moderator appoint said committee.

Whereupon, A. W. Morgan, C. R. Camp and Peter Smith were chosen. Moved to adjourn till three o'clock. Prayer by Bro. Goff. Adjourned.

Pursuant to adjournment the Association met, and after prayer by Bro. Clouser, proceeded to business.

The report of Committee on Constitution called for; whereupon the following Constitution was read and unanimously adopted:

Article 1.—This Association shall be known as the "Nemaha County Baptist Home Mission Association."

Art. 2.—The Officers of this Association shall consist of a Moderator, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall hold their offices until their successors are elected.

Art. 3.—The object of this Association shall be the further advancement of the Baptist cause and interest in this portion of the Territory of Nebraska.

Art. 4.—There shall be a Missionary Board appointed consisting of six members of this Association, whose duty shall be to correspond with the American Baptist Home Mission Society and with Ministers abroad; also, to ascertain what amount of funds can be raised at home and abroad for the support of efficient Gospel Ministers of the Baptist denomination in the bounds of the Nemaha County Association, and to employ one or more Ministers to preach in said territory.

Art. 5.—This Association shall meet as often as once in every three months, and oftener if thought best by the Missionary Board, and that event, they shall have power to call the Association together.

Moved that the Moderator appoint six brethren as a Missionary Board to solicit subscriptions to aid Ministers of the Gospel to preach in this County, to correspond with Ministers, &c.; whereupon A. W. Morgan, Peter Smith, C. R. Camp, C. M. Rodgers, J. A. Crook and David Jones, were appointed said Committee.

A. W. Morgan was elected Treasurer. Moved that the next meeting of this Association be with the Glen Rock Church, on the 3d Saturday in December next at 11 o'clock, A. M.

Moved that the proceedings of this Association be sent to the Nebraska Advertiser and Christian Times for publication.

Moved to Adjourn. Prayer by Bro. Morgan. Minutes called for, read and approved. Adjourned.
