We have had, this fall, in this section,
the finest weather we have experienced
for the past seven years, or since the
fall and winter of '59 and '60; during
which mechanics could work almost a y-
day, out doors, in their shirt sleeves.—
This is according to the theory of weath-
erologists that the weather is about the
same every seven years. If this weather
holds on, similar to that we have men-
tioned, those desiring to build need not
hesitate, but should "go in" and improve
the opportunity, so as not to crowd our
limited number of mechanics next Spring.

It seems to us it would be well for
each farmer to keep a book, in which to
register crops, when planted, kind of
seeds, general character of the weather
when planted, the yield, and all incidents
connected therewith which might be val-
uable as a guide in future operations; for
if this theory about the similarity of the
weather every seven years be true, this
would form an invaluable reference
book for the future conduct of crops, etc.,
in each seventh year. Try it.

to ascertain the amount of Stone taken
over the river.

Moved that an order be drawn in favor
of T. McLaughlin for \$229.10, in full
satisfaction for all claims against the
City for building Culvert.

Ordered that the Clerk draw an order
in favor of Lawrence & Giles for the
sum of \$353.71, in full satisfaction for
filling in dry over Culvert.

On motion Council adjourned until
Monday evening next.
