Grading—Is going on and being put under contract all over our city, and is being pushed ahead with such energy that this season will give us a system of good streets to almost every portion of the city. Mr. Wilson has a contract for taking out 10,000 yards of dirt on Atlantic street alone, which is believed will take it on a good grade from the river to 4th street. Parties are now at work cutting Main street down to the grade established last Fall, which will bring it into full view from the river to the bridge. Mr. Dewey's contract of 1,500 yards on second street will raise second between Main and Water to a good grade, and cut it down between Main and Atlantic to a good grade. Third and fourth streets will soon be put under contract and filled in between Water and Main and graded between Main and Atlantic. This will make these streets good and passable. The work is being pushed ahead by the Council, and the City Engineer is at work daily locating and fixing grades. The City Bands are going off at par and are in demand.
