Buckwheat.—We are pleased to note the enterprise of Messrs. Worthing & Wilcox in making arrangements to supply our farmers with seed Buckwheat.—Wherever the grasshoppers destroy the crops this may be profitably planted.—They have some now on the way, and have made arrangements to supply the demand, notwithstanding the scarcity of this kind of wheat in the eastern market. All orders promptly filled before seeding time.

Safe.—Capt. Jno. L. Carson has just removed, and is now placing in position in his Bank House on Main street, the large Iron Vault formerly used by the Nemaha Valley Bank. It will have connected with it a stock yard running clean through from Main to Water streets, with live water running through it, good shade trees for summer and sheds for winter protection.

Peru.—We are pleased to learn that Peru is flourishing and will apply for and receive a City Charter from the present session of the Legislature. This is a necessity to the increasing business and population. They design immediately upon organization to grade some of the principal streets and otherwise improve generally.

We learn that at least 100,000 bushels of corn have been shipped from that point during the present season. We learn also that the citizens of Peru held a meeting on the 30th to raise funds grade a wagon road around the bluffs to Nebraska City to avoid the bottom which is almost impassable during the rainy season. A sufficient sum to start the work was subscribed at the meeting.

Serious Accident.—We have this week to record a serious and painful accident to R. J. Whitney, of this City. Last Saturday evening, while going to his home, on Main street, took short cut around the lot just excavated by Mr. Blake on the corner of Main and 2d and, when near the highest point of the embankment, stepped over, falling about fourteen feet, upon a kind of second bench, striking upon some large rocks, breaking the thigh bone of the left leg and lacerating the right leg below the knee taking the flesh off and laying the bone bare. From this he fell off into the bottom of the excavation, a distance of about five feet, striking upon his head. This last fall did no other injury than to bruise his head, if it did not injure the spine.

Mayor's Office, BROWNVILLE, Monday, June 24, 1887.

Present, Mayor Church, and aldermen McPherson, Morrison, Stewart, Hacker, and Wheeler. B. B. Rogers, Marshal, T. R. Fisher, City Engineer, and W. H. McGreevy, Clerk. J. N. Reynolds, City Attorney.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved. Contract of J. C. Deuser and Jacob Marohn of the first part and City of Brownville, of the second part, read and laid on the table to be taken up at any time.

Stanios, Perkins & Co., presented a petition with the requisite number of names, asking a license to sell liquors. Granted.

J. S. Church, Mayor, presented a bill for amount paid by him for Bond and Order Book of fifty six dollars and fifty cents. Clerk ordered to draw an order for same in favor of Messrs. Mills & Co.

T. R. Fisher, presented a bill for establishing grades, assistants \$c as per bill on file, for One hundred and fourteen dollars and sixty cents. Clerk ordered to draw an order for same.

Ordered that the Clerk draw an order on the Treasury in favor of Geo. W. Hill & Co., for \$18, for publishing Ordinances three weeks.

Ordered that the Clerk draw an order on the Treasury in favor of Jos. Baker for the sum of \$5, for repairing City Pump.

Ordered that an order be drawn in favor of W. S. M'Gawen for \$200, part payment on contract for grading Main Street.

Ordered that Clerk draw an order on Treasury in favor of J. H. Morrison, for \$40 for assessing City. Contract made by Council of 1886.

Mayor appointed a Committee of four. T. R. Fisher, Engineer, Dr. Stewart, T. C. Hacker, C. W. Wheeler, to examine bridge on 2nd street between Main and Water, and report at next meeting.

Mayor authorized to contract with Maryon F. Boyd for grading on Main street between 5th and 9th at his bid of 29 3/4 cents per cubic yard cut and fill, also, at his bids on 3d and 4th streets at 30 cents, also, on 2d street.

Mayor entered into contract with Messrs. W. F. Wilson, M. E. Stewart and Thos. J. McKenzie for grading on Atlantic street as per agreement on file. Council adjourned to meet June 6th, at 8 o'clock.

On motion the mayor and J. H. Morrison was appointed a committee to examine said culvert, an order doing which they think best to drain water from above.
