This amendment has not yet been ratified by three-fourths of the States in the Union. The Legislatures of some of the States are now about convening for the first time since said proposition of amendment was proposed by Congress, and will doubtless ratify the same .--Among the States which have already done so are Ohio, New Jersey and California. The Democracy carried the Legislature of these States by small majorities on local issues last fall, and as the Legislatures so elected are about to convene, leading Democrats of the country recommend the Legislators so elected to repeal or rescind the action of the previous Legislatures in ratifying the said amendment. In accordance therewith resolutions to this effect have been introduced in both houses of the Ohio Legislature. This amendment was proposed above.
