MERCHANTS OF MAIN STREET, with you now rest the lease to improve your condition. Main street must be finished to the western limits immediately! To fall back upon your dignity and assert that it ought have been done with the first bonds expended don't help the matter; let all admit this, and it will not improve the road, or prevent trade from being diverted from us. All, or nearly all, who have been benefited by the recent grading have sought the workmen and added a bonus to the bonds; shall Main street, representing a capital of over a quarter of a million dollars, lag for the paltry sum necessary to pay the difference on these bonds? Not a merchant but could agree to take one, two or three hundred dollars in bonds for goods at 90 cents on the dollar; all will need to pay a bond and would pay you back double the sum in increased business in one season. Again, your united action is necessary upon matters outside of the city. Roads, leading to this city, are being fenced up in several instances in such manner as to force men living from three to five miles from town to travel six or eight to reach it. The greatest enemy to your complete prosperity is unity of action. Because business is brisk now is the greatest argument for doing all you can to still increase. Flushed victors in the fight against still times, now is your opportunity to lay the foundation, and abate the taint that is naturally and legitimately yours. A PUBLIC NUISANCE!—This is the only term that can be appropriately applied to Love street between Main and Water streets; it is a perfect mud hole at present, delightfully mixed with manure and rubbish generally. The bridge leading from Water over Love street is washed out, and also the embankment made to turn the water down the ditch on Water street to the river. This ditch, at present, is a nuisance, it is not deep enough for

one thing, it is open, which is a nuisance and the sewer which the water is expected to make will never last. This water should be run straight to the river from Rainey & Lewis' warehouse in a covered culvert, either walked up or protected in such a manner, clear to the river, to prevent accidents and to prevent the water from washing out at the foot of Water as it has on Main. Next to Main street this is the most important inlet to this city. All the travel from across the river now comes up Water street, as also from the lower bottom and from the southwest. The railroad, which will be completed to opposite this city this week will bring much of the goods for this city and inland towns even during the boating season, and after the close of navigation, all most come that way. These reasons, coupled with the necessities of the inhabitants along the streets and the health of that portion of the city, we hope will be sufficient to cause our city fathers, who we know have the welfare of our whole city at heart, to act promptly to improve the condition of that portion of our city.

SIDEWALKS.—Since our last we have been asked the course necessary to take in order to bring the owners of lots to grade their sidewalks; we answer in the wording of our City Charter, section 27: "When the owners of two-thirds of the whole line of the lots bordering on any street or alley in the city, or a part of any street or alley not less than one whole square between any two streets crossing the same and measuring only the front line of such lots, shall petition the Mayor and Council to have the sidewalks graded and paved, * * * the Mayor and Council shall cause the same to be done by contract given to the best bidder, after advertising to receive proposals therefor. * * * and the owners of the lots bordering on such street * * * shall be liable to the contractor for their proportion of the cost." This is the substance of the law. Now, although these pavements are a public convenience and necessary, their management rests solely with the residents of the block fronting on the street to be improved. Now, the fronting Main street on blocks 18, 17 and 18 are graded down, except a lot or half lot in each block; and upon the lot or half lot, graded, and blocks 5 and 6 a slight fill in front of a lot or two and the pavements on Main street will be graded. Let the public eye master upon the lot owner, and if the public demand for this improvement is not soon complied with, those residing in the block should ask the Mayor and Council to have it done.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS. [Official.] MAYOR'S OFFICE, BROWNVILLE, APRIL 24, 1896. Present: Geo. W. Fairbrother, Mayor. Jno. L. Carson, R. W. Furnas, Jas. L. McFee, and C. G. Dorsey, Aldermen. Jas. C. McNaughton, Clerk. W. A. Polock, Marshal.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Mayor appointed the following committee:—J. L. Carson and R. W. Furnas, Ways and Means; C. G. Dorsey and C. P. Stewart, Finance; R. W. Furnas and J. L. McFee, Streets and Alleys. Moved that the Clerk procure a desk for the safe keeping of the papers and documents belonging to the city, at a cost not exceeding ten dollars. Ayes, Furnas, Dorsey, Fairbrother; Nays, Carson and McFee.

On motion, the bonds of the various officers were fixed as follows: Mayor \$500, Marshal and Street Commissioner \$500, Clerk \$100, and Assessor \$100. On motion, Mr. Wilson was directed to deposit the dirt now being removed by him on Atlantic street, in such place or places as the Street Commissioner may designate, within the limits of the contract.

The account of J. N. Reynolds, City Attorney, for services for one year, (\$400) was referred to committee on finance. "The committee to whom the account of Thomas R. Fisher, Engineer, for one and a fourth days services in measuring grade on Fourth street west of school house and north of Main street, at \$4 50 per day, have examined the same and recommend that the sum of \$5 50 be allowed from bond fund. Also, have examined the account of William H. Hoover for services as City Treasurer from April 1, 1867 to March 31, 1868, and recommend that the account be allowed, and an order issued for \$150 on General fund.

Also, recommend that the account of Thomas R. Fisher for removing 18 1/2 yards of earth on Atlantic street, at 32 cents per yard, cut and fill, be allowed, and an order for \$6 00 on the bond fund be issued." J. L. McFee, Chairman.

On motion the committee on Ways and Means were instructed to prepare and report at next meeting, a Fee Bill or Salary for the services of City Attorney, Fire Warden, Street Commissioner and Marshal.

The following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That all orders or resolutions, or any other business, heretofore granted or any petition or persons who may, to outdo the terms of the streets of Brownville, be revoked; and that the Marshal and Street Commissioner be requested to inform the parties interested of the passage of this resolve.

On motion, the City Attorney was requested to inform this council at its next meeting whether or not in his opinion any further ordinance is necessary in order to secure the legal and proper collection of taxes levied by the city.

The following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That a select committee of three be appointed, with instructions to examine the records of the city, and ascertain the amount of money collected for fines and licenses, to which the school fund does or may be entitled; and also to ascertain whether or not any money has been collected and used by the city which ought to have been paid into the school fund; and that such committee be authorized to prepare the best legal advice attainable on the subject, and report at the next meeting of the council.

The Mayor appointed Messrs. Dorsey, Furnas and Carson as the above committee. The report of Wm. H. Hoover, Treasurer, was ordered to be spread upon the records as part of the proceedings of the council. May 1st, 1896. Present, Mayor Fairbrother; Aldermen Furnas, Carson and Stewart.

The petition of William H. Vallau & Co., to sell malt, spirits and vinous liquors in the city of Brownville, for the period of six months from May 1st, 1896, was received. On motion, it was resolved that the prayer of the petition be granted, and that a license issue to said Vallau & Co., for the term of six months at the rate of \$21 per annum. Franchise. That said applicants donate to the city and pay into the hands of the City Treasurer the sum of \$87.50 at the time said license issues, to be used for city purposes. Petition of Garrison & Roberts for license to sell liquors for six months from May 1st, 1896, was received, and on motion, was granted on the same terms and provisions as Vallau & Co.

Petition of Charles Briegel to sell malt liquors at his saloon on Main street, for six months from May 1st, 1896, was granted upon the payment by said Briegel of a license of \$12.50, provided he donates \$12.50 to the city to be used for city purposes. On motion, the bonds of Vallau & Co., and Garrison & Roberts were fixed at \$1,000 each, and that of Charles Briegel at \$500.

The following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That the City Street Commissioner be instructed to forthwith inform Dr. Blackburn, contractor, to at once remove the dirt deposited by him in the gutter at the confluence of Fourth and Main streets, on the north side; and if this order of the council is not complied with within four days, that the said Commissioner be requested to perform the work at the expense of the aforesaid contractor.

Moved that the Street Commissioner be directed to repair Atlantic street, so that the water may be turned into its proper channel on Fourth street.—Carried.

On motion, W. F. Wilson's claim for work done on streets, was referred to committee on Streets and Alleys.

On motion, adjourned. J. G. McNAUGHTON, Clerk.

Financial and Commercial. FINANCIAL. MAT. 6, 1896. Gold is steady at 139 3/4 @ 139 1/2. The probable results of the impeachment trial and the high rates of Exchange and large exports of specie, have helped to encourage the upward tendency in Gold. To-day the market opened in New York at 139 3/4 and closed at 139 1/2. Governments have ruled firm with an upward tendency.

On the 15th of May about \$20,000,000 Compound Interest Note will mature, and, carrying three years interest, about \$4,000,000 payable in cash. The principal may be exchanged for the new 3 per cent certificates, if the holders (principally banks) so desire. The balance of the compound interest, some \$25,000,000, matures during the months of August, September and October next.

The issue of \$1,000,000 in gold-something over \$25,000,000—on U. S. 5-20 bonds, comprises the issue of 1862, \$914,789,500, 1864, \$129,443,800, and about \$20,000,000 of 1865 bonds, the latter being an estimate.
