The State Fair this Fall-

As is well known to all our readers the Nebraska State Fair will be held at this place this fall. The Nemaha County Agricultural Association has tendered the free use of their grounds and agreed to fit them up in good al ability style for the Fair, free of expense to the State Board: In order to do this, material aid will be needed from the city of Brownville. About two thousand dollars will be needed to comply with the pledges of the County Soci ety. The ground is to be fenced, additional buildings and stock pens erected, the track enlarged, and many other improvements made in order to accommodate the demands of the Fair, as well as to sustain the reputation of the town. The plan of the Local Board to raise the money is this : There is now about \$350,00 in the Treasury of the County Society. The Board is authorized to sell 60 Life Memberships at \$20 each. This would make \$1200. The sum of \$500 we think, should be appropriated by the City Council. This is usual on the part of points at which State Fairs great credit. are held. The actual benefit to the town will be more than ten times that amount. This benefit will be conferred on all proportionately, and all should correspondingly render aid. which can be done in no other way than the one suggested. Heretofore in such matters, aid has been rendered by subscriptions obtained. In this way a few liberal men do all, and the majority do nothing.
