COUNCIL CHAMBERS, March 17, 1870.

On motion the petition was granted, and the Clerk was directed to draw an order on the General Fund for \$500.

On motion the Mayor be and is hereby empowered to cast the vote of the City Council for seven directors on the Brownville, Fort Kearney & Pacific Railroad.
