In continuation of the same subject as trees shelter the solt from the solar . radiation, they must diminish the

force of the sun's rays, especially in the lower strain of the atmosphere. The exhalation of moisture by trees produces cold in the nir by abstracting the latent heat from it. This low-

ering of the temperature gives to the air a greater degree of humidity. Again, the leaves of trees exercise an important influence in cooling the at-

musphere, as the tree itself, by its radiation of heat, becomessensibly lower in temperature, and thus cools the nir as it plays among the leaves."


