

REMARKABLE SURGICAL CASE. Undergoes the Process of Skin Graft-ing Successfully—No Similar Case on Passen AT 7115

The Waterbury (Coan.) American contains an account of successful surgery that is worthy of notice. It is the case of Miss Hattie Thomas, who more than a year ago, while in the employment of Edwin Smith, a manfacturer of buttons in Naugatuck, had her hair torn completely off her head from the nape of the neck to the forehead, including one eyebrow and part of one ear, by being caught in revolving shaft. The wound was worse than the scalping by an Indian, who merely cuts a circle of three or four inches diameter about the crown, and leaves his victim tonsured like a Roman monk or friar. Such eases of scalping are on record in which the loss of the natural headcovering was skull threatened death by exhaustion induced by suppuration. The American says:
