The Arrest of William M. Tweed.

the arrest of William M. Tweed, as furnished by a cable dispatch from Madrid, Spain: It was found, in July last, that Tweed was in Santiago Nominations for three Representa- de Cuba, having passed there from name of Henry Steinman, of Benton; Tweed secured and sent to the United tradition treaty, to oblige the Ameriin Santiago of his impending danger, and sailed for Vigo, Spain, July 27, on board the sailing vessel Carmen. Mr. Cushing thereupon notified the Spanish Government of this fact, and found them willing to arrest Tweed and return him to Cuba, or deliver him up to the American Consul. Every precaution was taken by the Spanish Government to secure Tweed's arrest in any port of Spain or on any coast line by which he might arrive. Severe orders were given to local authorities especially those of Tigo and the Gall cian coast. On Sept. 6 the Carmen hove in sight off Vigo, and was immediately boarded by the Governor of Pontevedra. The Governor at once recognized Tweed from photographs which he had in his possession for Kenzie, withdrew his name from the some time previous to the arrival of contest, whereupon W. F.
