STEVENSON & CROSS. -On Thursday of last week a man giving his name as Jordan Harris came into our sanctum and said he wanted us to do him a favor, and without pecuniary reward, as he was impetuous in the extreme degree. We told him not to mention it—that we were working especially for the good of the race, and to spin his yarn, which he did as follows: "I have come all the way from Shelby county, Ohio, in search of my children—a son and a daughter, especially my daughter, who was stolen, or coaxed away from home by one John Rhodes, a neighbor. On the 14th of last May Rhodes, with his wife and three children—probably four now, as there was one prospective—gather up his traps and left that country; my son 20 years old and daughter 15 years old, left with him. My son's name is Joseph, my daughter's name is Elvina. Rhodes and his wife are bad people—I am on their track—have heard of them several times—last time 60 miles east of here—believe they crossed the river at Brownville and are in Nebraska or Kansas. Rhodes sometimes passes Elvira for his wife, and Joseph claiming Mrs. Rhodes as his wife. My daughter is ruined, but I want her out of Rhodes' power, and want you to advertise him, so that good people may know him, and to the end that he may be arrested and punished for his crime. I am going from here to Maryville, Kansas, where any information concerning Rhodes or my daughter will find me and be thankfully received."

Harris then gave a description of the outfit he is as follows: John Rhodes is about 6 feet 11 inch high, very dark complexioned, black hair and eyes, slender made, about 35 years old. He drove a rather small bay mare, blind in both eyes, and a big roan horse with a big warty face, to an ordinary looking wagon. Joseph Harris is heavy made, nearly 6 feet high dark complexioned. Elvira Harris is "heavy set," probably a little over five feet in height, light brown hair, rather fair complexion, full face. One of Rhodes' children, a little girl, has a stiff finger, caused by the cut of a hatchet.

We remarked to Harris that his son Joseph was as much of a villain as Rhodes, that his influence could have saved his sister, and that he had evidently bartered her virtue and blasted her future for the illicit companionship of the Rhodes woman. "Yes, it looks that way," answered the stricken father.
