The above table gives the vote of the precincts as nearly as we can ascertain the figures before the official count. We could not get even an estimate from the precincts omitted, but can give Gilmore's majorities about correctly. In Benton his majority is 61, in Douglas 33. In Bratton Culbertson received 11 majority, in Douglas 7. Next week we will give the official vote in full.
