For Small Pox and Scarlet Fever.

The following has been going the rounds of the news papers for many years. Cut it out and preserve it.

CHICAGO, FEB. 17.—Mother Gonzago's "small pox remedy," which appears in to-day's Tribune, I find, from a clipping in my scrap-book, (cut out years ago,) is corroborated in a very emphatic manner. Said clipping is by a correspondent of the Stockton, (Cal.) Herald and is as follows:

I herewith append a receipt which has been used to my knowledge in hundreds of cases. It will prevent or cure small pox, though the pittings are filling. It will also cure scarlet fever. Here is the receipt as I have used it to cure small pox. When learned physicians said the patient must die it cured.

Sulphate of zinc, one grain. Foxglove (digitalis), one grain. Half a teaspoonful of sugar.

Mix with two teaspoonfuls of water; when thoroughly mixed add four ounces of water. Take a teaspoonful every hour. Either disease will disappear in twelve hours. For a child, small doses, according to their age.

If countries would compel physicians to use this, there would be no need of pest-houses. If you value advice and experience, use this for that terrible disease.

I notice also the same specifics exactly, written on a fly-leaf of said scrap book (in 1878), assigned to "J. D. L." of Covington, Ky., who styles it the "Paris" recipe for small pox and scarlet fever. McCURE.

The Rural Home gives the following remedy:

A neighbor of mine recently informed me that he had lost a most valuable horse by a casualty by no means uncommon. A knowledge of a simple remedy would have prevented this loss. The horse trod upon a nail which entered his foot. Lameness followed, the nail was extracted, but lockjaw supervened, resulting in death. An unerring remedy in such cases is muriatic acid. If, when a nail is withdrawn from a horse's foot, the foot should be held up and some muriatic acid be poured into the wound, neither lameness nor lockjaw need be feared. Why the iron should have the effect which it frequently has, and the rationale of the above remedy, I am unable to explain; but of the certainty of the counteraction of disease by this perfectly safe application, I am well convinced.

Nemaha school district organized under the new law, and elected the following board: Seymour Howe and D. Tourtlot were elected for the term of one year, B. Bell Andrews and Philip Crother for the term of two years, and Stephen A. Gilbert and C. C. Donald for the term of three years. It was decided to levy a ten mills tax—five mills to be applied on the teachers' fund and five mills on the contingent fund.

The latter road is completed to Blue Springs, coming in this direction, and nearly to Culbertson on the west, about 300 miles from this point. Nemaha will have in a short time a railroad bridge machine shops, etc., and will be the most important town in the county. Our natural advantages are unequalled.
