- The waters of the Missouri began to fall last Friday, and have gone down rapidly since. The water is off of the bottoms except in basins which will not drain. There is plenty of mud, however that would mire a duck, and sandbars in people's houses.

- Ex-Gov. Furnas has issued a circular card announcing the fact that the crop of Forest Tree Seedlings is a failure this spring, caused by the high water in the Missouri, which flooded the sand-bars, bottoms, and other places where such plants are usually found.

- At a recent meeting of the managers of the coming State Fair, the practicability of lighting the grounds with electric light was discussed, and taken under consideration. The Brady electric light company propose to place sixteen lights in the grounds and houses at a cost of \$3,140. That would be a big advertisement, and would "draw" immensely.

- The Boston Journal of Chemistry says:

"Beef tea is too well known to need any special recommendation. But it is too often spoiled in the making. One ounce of beef to six tablespoonfuls of water is a fair proportion for a good article. Cut the meat into dice, put it into a stewpan and add the water cold. Certain components of the beef are soluble in cold water; therefore let it stand ten minutes, then put it to heat very gradually, and at last boil it for ten minutes.

STATE NEWS.

- John Binder, of Colfax county, lost his entire flock of 400 sheep, with the exception of 19, during the late high water.

- Tecumseh's board of trade has asked Saunders county to contribute \$4,000 towards the construction of a bridge across the Platte.

- Work on the railroad near Table Rock is progressing rapidly. The town will be hemmed in with tracks when it is completed.

- From fifteen saloons Columbus has now got down to two under the new ordinance with the new law.

- Mr. Mead killed two wild cats one day last week, just south of the river from Riverton. One of them weighed twenty-three pounds.

- The saloon of Wiely & Co., at Carleton was entered last week and the faucets knocked out of seven kegs and barrels, entailing a loss of over \$800.

- Osceola has presented a petition to the county commissioners of Polk county, asking a special election to vote \$3,000 in precinct bonds for a new court house.

- Eight hundred people of Tecumseh have signed a petition praying the governor to pardon Henry Parish, who is now serving a fifteen years' sentence in the penitentiary.

- A West Point couple, who could not get a license in Cuming county, owing to the death of the county judge, went over the Dodge county line in a sleigh and were married in a snow bank.

- Mr. Bohartz, a Bohemian farmer living one and a half miles southeast of Crete, had a cow killed by lightning during the thunder storm last week.

- The Holt county authorities are looking for two more of the cowboys, Stuart and Smith, as accessories to the murder of Sheriff Kearns.

- Leavitt's bridge over Salt Creek, near Lincoln, broke down last week while Mr. Cadman and his team were crossing. The horses were both drowned, but the young man swam to shore.

- The annual shooting tournament of the Nebraska State Sportsmen's association will be held on the fair grounds in Nebraska City on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, May 17th, 18th, 19th, 20th.

- Mr. John Malley, of Exeter, lost a 250 pound hog during the first week in February. The hog dug himself out of a snow bank last week, and weighed only 90 pounds.

- Henry Fields and David Barkdale quarreled at school meeting in Madison county, and the latter received a severe cut on the left arm. Fields fled, and it is said this is the second man whose life he had recently attempted.

- No lives were lost by the high water at Niobrara, and the damage to the town is slight. The river at that point during the flood was about six miles in width. Its surface is now covered with broken ice. A few miles east of that point the breadth of the water was twelve miles, retaining this width without exception for forty-five miles.

- On Wednesday last a Dane with a yoke of cattle, a cow, a wife and three children fell into the hands of the horse traders over the river, and was fleeced of his team and cow, and started on his journey with a span of mules that were not able to work at all. The indignation of our people was aroused, and the horse traders, gave the man his cattle and cow again.—Beatrice Democrat.

- Some of the friends of Rev. Father Cusson, of St. Mary's church, Nebraska City, recently presented that gentleman a nice span of iron gray buggy horses.

- A citizen of Columbus, by the name of Graves, on the 28th ult., was run over by a train of cars and killed.

- The wife of Christian Koch, an engine wiper, at St. Paul, killed her three children and herself.

- R. H. N. Kelly, cashier of B. & M. R. R. at Omaha, has been detected in heavy embezzlement of the funds of the company, and now languishes in jail. He is a man of family.

- Samuel B. Jones, for a long time chief clerk in the general passenger and ticket office of the U. P. railway, has been promoted to the position of assistant general passenger agent.

- A traveler at U. P. headquarters the other day was confounded out of \$20, by the old bogus check game.

- Omaha is going to have another big hotel—to cost \$100,000.
