The Good Templars of Nemaha City are talking of having a Good Templars' picnic on the 4th of July.

We have as yet heard none of the business men of Nemaha City talking of moving to Calvert. They have too good a thing here.

Biri Hoover is building a substantial sidewalk on the north and west sides of his block. The walk is made of two inch pine lumber, spiked to four stringers and when finished will be the best walk in town.

Jay Gould has filed articles of incorporation for the Missouri Pacific Railway Company of Nebraska. The road will be an extension of the Missouri Pacific in Kansas, and will run from Atchison to Falls City, and from there to Omaha. Starting from the latter city, the road will probably be built to Syracuse, and will then come down the Nemaha valley to Nemaha City, and from here to Falls City. This is the Natural route, and the one that will in all probability be followed. The B. & M. Co. will probably extend their line from this point to Falls City and from Nebraska City to Plattsmouth, this summer. The company, we learn, will in a short time put in a transfer at this point. They recently purchased the Joy, at Nebraska City, and are having it repaired for that purpose. A road will probably be built from the east soon, to connect with their line running west from this point, and a railroad bridge will then be built. This will place Nemaha City on two through north and south lines, and on a through east and west line. Nemaha City now has the best prospects of any town in the county. It is bound to be the boss town of southeastern Nebraska.
