Kelly, who was to have been hung at Santa Fe on Friday last, was respited for the second time until the 19th inst.

The Mississippi spring freshet has reached Dubuque, flooding the lowlands and likely to result in great loss of property.

The large house of A. T. Stewart & Co., New York, is about to close business, the goods being advertised for sale at attractive prices.

The Canadian government has received a proposal from Capt. James B. Eads for the construction of a serviceable harbor at Toronto.

Three ringleaders of a gang of horse thieves operating in southern Missouri were hunted down and strung up by infuriated citizens the past week.

The Fargo delegation in Washington is moving for the division of Dakota so that issue may not be complicated with the admission of the southern section as a State.

H. Smith and Edward Fulsom, convicted of the murder of Wm. Messenger and John Stewart, in the Choctaw nation, near Waldron, last August, have been sentenced to be hanged June 30th.

Capt. Pugh, of Racine, Wisconsin, was killed by Hardy Clifford, a well known Milwaukee gambler, and it is probable that before this item gets before the public the murderer will be dangling at the end of a rope.

Ex-Governor Burbank, of Dakota, who was robbed by the James gang eight years ago of a gold watch and chain and diamond pin worth \$900, has received notice that his property has been recovered and awaits his orders.

It is reported from Moscow that eighty workmen employed on the Usanski cathedral were arrested in consequence of the discovery of a mine under the edifice in which the ceremony of the coronation of the czar was to take place.

At a meeting of the republican national committee in Washington Saturday, the sentiment of those present unanimously favored the republicans in the south uniting with the liberal democrats and working for a free ballot and fair count.

Mrs. Scoville's petition for the appointment of a conservator of the estate of Guiteau came up Saturday before Judge Loomis in Chicago. The court refused to hear the petition, and Mrs. Scoville's attorney will appeal the matter to the supreme court.

Prof. Chittenden, who made the analysis of the remains of Jennie E. Cramer, furnished his report to the State authorities, but they refused to make public the result. Enough has now been ascertained to warrant the positive statement that more than three grains of arsenic were found. In the analysis for the preliminary hearing only a small part of the body was examined and the total amount of arsenic in the system was estimated. Since then the analysis has been extended so that the report is no longer inferential.

Five of the principle eastern trunk lines brought in 9,000 and 1,000 more will arrive to-day. It is estimated 1,000 will remain in Chicago. The remainder were ticketed to Dakota and Minnesota, 80 per cent. to the latter.
