### PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, The constitution of the  
State of Nebraska provides that "The  
Governor may, on extraordinary occa-  
sions, convene the legislature by  
proclamation;" and,

WHEREAS, Important public interests  
of an extraordinary character require  
the exercise of this authority,

Therefore, I, Albinus Nance, Gov-  
ernor of the State of Nebraska, do  
hereby convene the legislature of said  
State to meet in special session at the  
capitol, in Lincoln, on Wednesday, the  
10th day of May, 1882, at 12 o'clock m.  
of said day, for the purposes herein  
stated, to-wit:

First—To apportion the State into  
three Congressional Districts, and to  
provide for the election of representa-  
tives therein.

Second—To amend an act approved  
March 1st, 1881, entitled, an act to in-  
corporate cities of the first class, and  
regulating their duties, powers and  
government," by conferring additional  
power upon cities of the first class, for  
the purpose of paving or macadamizing  
streets and alleys, and also providing  
for the creation and appointment of a  
board of public works therein.

Third—To assign the county of Custer  
to some Judicial District in the  
State.

Fourth—To amend Section sixty-  
nine (69) Chapter fourteen (14), of the  
Compiled Statutes of Nebraska, en-  
titled "Cities of the second class and  
villages."

Fifth—To provide for the payment  
of expenses incurred in suppressing the  
recent riots at Omaha and protecting  
citizens of the State from domestic  
violence.

Sixth—To give the assent of the  
State to the provisions of an act of con-  
gress to extend the northern boundary  
of the State or Nebraska.

Seventh—To provide for the payment  
of the ordinary and contingent expenses  
of the legislature, incurred during the  
special session hereby convened.

In testimony whereof I have here-  
unto set my hand and caused to be  
affixed the great seal of the State.

Done at Lincoln this twentieth day  
of April, A. D. 1882, the sixteenth year  
of the State, and of the Independence  
of the United States the one hundred  
and sixth.
