gives Omaha a direct communication
with the Gould system of southwestern
railways, and is one of the most im-
portant lines ever constructed into
Omaha."

From Central Illinois.

Editor of The Advertiser.

Dear Sir:—I will take my pen in
hand to drop you a few lines about this
part of the country, which will
interest some of your readers. Wheat
with a few exceptions looks tolerably
well, it is just beginning to head out.
Oats also looks tolerably well. There
has been some corn planted but the
heavy rains we have had for the last
two weeks almost without cessation,
makes it necessary for many of the
farmers to replot and plant their
ground. The corn planted is beginning
to rot in the ground. Apples, peaches
and cherries promise a fair crop. Prices
for all grain is high. Corn is worth
from 65 to 75 cents; oats 45 cents;
wheat \$1.25. Hogs are worth from
6 to 7 cents per hundred. We have
had rainy weather pretty much all the
time since September last, until about
four weeks ago. Farmers had to gather
their corn last winter, with but few
exceptions in the mud, which was
sometimes half boot-top deep. There
is quite a mania for correspondents in
different parts of this neighborhood,
and so I thought I would try my hand
